MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: US Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) Pre-2015 Regulatory Regime
Approved Jurisdictional Determination in Light of *Sackett v. EPA*, 143 S. Ct. 1322
(2023) , MVM-2023-342 (MFR 1 of 1)

BACKGROUND. An Approved Jurisdictional Determination (AJD) is a Corps document stating the presence or absence of waters of the United States on a parcel or a written statement and map identifying the limits of waters of the United States on a parcel. AJDs are clearly designated appealable actions and will include a basis of JD with the document.¹ AJDs are case-specific and are typically made in response to a request. AJDs are valid for a period of five years unless new information warrants revision of the determination before the expiration date or a District Engineer has identified, after public notice and comment, that specific geographic areas with rapidly changing environmental conditions merit re-verification on a more frequent basis.² For the purposes of this AJD, we have relied on section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899 (RHA),³ the Clean Water Act (CWA) implementing regulations published by the Department of the Army in 1986 and amended in 1993 (references 2.a. and 2.b. respectively), the 2008 *Rapanos-Carabell* guidance (reference 2.c.), and other applicable guidance, relevant case law and longstanding practice, (collectively the pre-2015 regulatory regime), and the *Sackett* decision (reference 2.d.) in evaluating jurisdiction.

This Memorandum for Record (MFR) constitutes the basis of jurisdiction for a Corps AJD as defined in 33 CFR §331.2. The features addressed in this AJD were evaluated consistent with the definition of “waters of the United States” found in the pre-2015 regulatory regime and consistent with the Supreme Court’s decision in *Sackett*. This AJD did not rely on the 2023 “Revised Definition of ‘Waters of the United States,’” as amended on 8 September 2023 (Amended 2023 Rule) because, as of the date of this decision, the Amended 2023 Rule is not applicable Tennessee due to litigation.

3. REVIEW AREA. The review area covers a portion of an approximately 1233-acre property located in Denmark, Madison County, Tennessee. The project area is located southeast of TN-223, east of Neely Station Cutoff Road, north and south of Mt. Pinson Road, and west of Betty Manley Road. Approximate coordinates of the site are 35.544895°N, -88.933651°W.

4. NEAREST TRADITIONAL NAVIGABLE WATER (TNW), INTERSTATE WATER, OR THE TERRITORIAL SEAS TO WHICH THE AQUATIC RESOURCE IS CONNECTED. The project area drains to the South Fork Forked Deer River.

5. FLOWPATH FROM THE SUBJECT AQUATIC RESOURCES TO A TNW, INTERSTATE WATER, OR THE TERRITORIAL SEAS

Wetland-10 (WTL-10) flows from the wetland into a culvert that leads to an ephemeral stream (EPH-13) that turns into an agricultural ditch (AGD-3) that leads to a farm pond (P-11) that has an outlet culvert that leads to a perennial stream (STR-HC).

Pond-7 (P-7) overflows over a farm crossing by an erosional swale (EPH-9) into an intermittent stream (STR-12) that flows into a perennial stream (STR-JC).

- (WTL-10) - The wetland touches a non-RPW through a culvert which flows through several additional features before flowing into an RPW. Because discrete features cannot be used to establish a CSC, the wetland is not abutting the RPW. The wetland does not meet the CSC requirement and is thus not considered an adjacent wetland and therefore not a water of the United States.
- (P-7) - The pond touches a swale (non-relatively permanent) which flows into an RPW but was not constructed within and is not an impoundment of an RPW. Therefore, the pond is not considered a water of the United States.
